Todd Albert, MD, Hospital for Special Surgery (New York). Dr. Albert is surgeon-in-chief, medical director and Korein-Wilson Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery at HSS. He also serves as chairman of the department of orthopedic surgery and a professor of orthopedic surgery at Weill Cornell Medical College in New York.

Recommended anonymously. "He is surgeon-in-chief at HSS coming from Rothman. Dr. Albert has written more than 200 papers and text books. He is one of the best cervical spine surgeons."

David Altchek, MD, Hospital for Special Surgery (New York). Dr. Altchek is an attending orthopedic surgeon and co-chief emeritus of the sports medicine and shoulder service at HSS. He has authored more than 100 articles and book chapters on shoulder, elbow and knee issues.

Recommended anonymously. "Dr. Altcheck is a medical director for the New York Mets and a thought-leader in the field of treating overhand athletes, like baseball and tennis players."

James Andrews, MD, Andrews Institute (Gulf Breeze, Fla). Dr. Andrews is a founding member of the Andrews Sports Medicine and Orthopaedic Center in Birmingham, Ala., and of the Andrews Institute. He serves as the medical director of the Andrews Institute and as president and chairman of the Andrews Research and Education Foundation.

Asheesh Bedi, MD, University of Michigan (Ann Arbor). Dr. Bedi is the Harold and Helen W. Gehring Early Career Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery and an assistant sports medicine and shoulder surgery professor at the University of Michigan and MedSport program. He is also a consultant for the NFL and NHL Players Association.

Recommended anonymously. "Dr. Bedi is much younger surgeon, but really the most prolific sports medicine researcher. He is a great sports medicine physician specializing in hip and knee arthroscopy."

Christopher Bibbo, DO, DPM, FACS, FAAOS, Marshfield (Wis.) Clinic. Dr. Bibbo is a clinical instructor in the orthopedics and rehabilitation department of the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine in Madison. He completed his fellowship training in orthopedic foot and ankle surgery at the Miller Orthopedic Clinic & Carolinas Medical Center in Charlotte, N.C.

James Bradley, MD, Burke & Bradley Orthopedics (Pittsburgh). In 2014, he received the Jerry Hawk Rhea Award from the NFL for his work as an NFL team physician. He has been the head team orthopedic surgeon for the Pittsburgh Steelers for more than 20 years.

Thomas A. Brandon, MD, Peninsula Orthopaedic Associates (Salisbury, Md.). Dr. Brandon is president of Peninsula Orthopaedic Associates and chief of the orthopedics division at Peninsula Regional Medical Center in Salisbury. He was one of the first orthopedic surgeons to perform minimally invasive knee replacement and arthroscopic repair of knee ligaments and rotator cuff tears.

Recommended by: Pasquale Petrera, MD. "Dr. Brandon trained at Wake Forest and came to Salisbury in 1990. He is single handedly responsible for turning a small six-man group into a 30 provider powerhouse without ever losing site of the most important aspect of medicine – good patient care. He embraced reverse shoulder arthroplasty in its infancy and has refined his technique to where he recognized at the large university centers in Baltimore and Philadelphia. He is one of the highest volume shoulder replacement specialists in the mid-Atlantic region and possibly the East Coast. His work and surgical skills are well recognized and known in the shoulder replacement field."

Frank Cammisa, MD, Hospital for Special Surgery (New York). Dr. Camissa is chief of the

spine service at HSS and a professor of clinical orthopedic surgery at Weill Cornell Medical College in New York. He serves as a spine consultant for the NHL.

Recommended anonymously. "Dr. Camissa is chief of spine at HSS. He serves as a spine consultant for many sports teams."

Michelle Carlson, MD, Hospital for Special Surgery (New York). Dr. Carlson is an associate attending orthopedic surgeon at HSS and New York-Presbyterian Hospital, as well as an associate professor at Weill Cornell Medical College in New York. She has won several awards throughout her medical career including the Ruth Jackson Orthopaedic Society/Zimmer Research Grant, Lewis Clark Wagner Research Award, T. Campbell Thompson Prize and Glasgow Memorial Achievement Citation.

Said G Osman, MD, FRCSEd (ortho), FAAOS, American Spine (Germantown, Md.): Dr. Anthony Yeung is an innovator and leader in the field of endoscopic spine surgery. Dr. Yeung has been training young surgeons the spine endoscopy techniques for over two decades and, often, was a lone voice advocating the approach to surgeons all over the world. It is partly thanks to his persistence, in the face of resistance by the mainstream surgeons, that the technology has now been embraced throughout the world for the benefit of patients and the society in general.

Susan Parker, Desert Institute for Spine Care director of business development (Phoenix): It is not always the smartest, but the most innovative and specialized surgeon that is the best, one with a proven record of solid outcomes that can be reproduced time and time again with similar results.

Dr. Anthony Yeung, a voluntary professor of neurosurgery at the University of New Mexico, appointed by Howard Yonas and their Board of Regents, and of DISC, has evolved his FDA-approved technique, the Yeung Endoscopic Spine System (YESStm), pioneered in 1995 as a method to treat painful conditions of an aging spine, and as an alternative to more invasive alternative to a fusion. This outpatient procedure allows patients a quicker recovery time, and preserves muscle and normal anatomy. The procedure is performed with only local anesthesia.

Dr. Yeung established the Yeung Endoscopic Spine Center at the University of New Mexico, his medical school Alma Mater, endorsed by Dr. Howard Yonas, Chief of Neurosurgery at UNM. Each month, he is training surgeon(s) at DISC or traveling to other countries to train other orthopedic spine surgeons and neurosurgeons in this procedure.

His vision now is to find a way to decrease the deterioration of an aging spine by focusing on treating the pain generator with the least invasive tissue sparing technique. True visionaries see things before they happen, and know the gold standard is only the standard of today but not necessarily the future. Pioneers and innovators see the future and find a way to offer patients

better alternatives for better health.

James Yue, MD, Yale School of Medicine (New Haven, Conn.). Dr. Yue is the director of the Yale Spine Fellowship, co-director of the Orthopaedic Spine Service at Yale and an associated professor of orthopedics and rehabilitation. He has a research interest in non-fusion spinal care, minimally invasive endoscopic spine surgery and more.

Joseph Zavatsky, MD, Florida Orthopaedic Institute (Tampa). Dr. Zavatsky has served as the director of the Spine, Scoliosis & Deformity Institute at at the Florida Orthopaedic Institute. He is a member of several professional organizations including the International Spine Study Group, Scoliosis Research Society, International Society for the Advancement of Spine Surgery and Society for Minimally Invasive Spine Surgery. He completed his fellowship training at the Istituto Ortopedico Galeazzi in Milano, Italy.
